Waiting for the Bridegroom

Over the past few months, we as a nation have experienced unprecedented changes. No one would have been able to foresee the changing landscape in every area of our lives. With the introduction of the coronavirus, everyone has been impacted. People were told they should shelter in place, businesses were ordered to be closed, churches have been closed, and schools went to an online format for the remainder of the spring semester. Hospitals have stopped treating so many people's illnesses to focus almost exclusively patients sick with this virus. Today, we all are being asked to wear a mask when are out in public to help stop the ongoing spread of this pandemic.

Socially, many people are struggling with underlying mental health. Isolation, fear, panic attacks, depression, loneliness, economic and food insecurity, are all taking its toll on millions.

Economically, families nest eggs are dwindling quickly. This will result in delinquent utility payments, skipped house and car payments, lapsed insurance policies, hunger and desperation, and eventually bankruptcy for millions of families. This will add more pressure to our already strained safety net of social programs.

We have also seen several groups rise up and demand many different changes in the way our nation has traditionally operated. Many people claim they have been systematically oppressed intentionally and/or unintentionally by various policies ranging from housing, education, law enforcement, and income disparity. Each group is clamoring for their demands to be met ... or else!

Even memorials that were erected in memory of various historical figures have been defaced and destroyed by angry mobs seeking to "change the world" and "free itself" from these perceived perpetrators of injustice. In some instances these have been valid concerns.

Over the past four months, we have seen a pandemic kill indiscriminately, an economic collapse, the Federal Government sending individuals \$1200, civil disobedience, and rioting in the streets of many urban cities across the nation. In case you are not aware, there have been numerous earthquakes around the world, an African dust storm covering half of America this week, and numerous military conflicts brewing between various nations.

I have met with several different pastor groups recently. We have shared how we are ministering to our congregations. I have listened as several black pastors have shared their perspective on the current events occurring today. I have gathered and prayed with a group of Kinston pastors seeking God's will for our congregations and for the City of Kinston. We are in a season of testing. (Continued on page 2)

Jesus was talking with His disciples one day and they wanted to know when the end of world was coming. I find that very interesting that every generation since Jesus' ascension back into heaven, has asked this same question. Jesus responded to the first generation of disciples and said this in Matthew 24:3-14, 36, 44:

³ And as he sat upon the mount of Olives, the disciples came unto him privately, saying, Tell us, when shall these things be? and what shall be the sign of thy coming, and of the end of the world? ⁴ And Jesus answered and said unto them, Take heed that no man deceive you. ⁵ For many shall come in my name, saying, I am Christ; and shall deceive many.

⁶ And ve shall hear of wars and rumours of wars: see that ve be not troubled: for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. ⁷ For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom: and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in diverse places. ⁸ All these are the beginning of sorrows.

⁹ Then shall they deliver you up to be afflicted, and shall kill you: and ye shall be hated of all nations for my name's sake. ¹⁰ And then shall many be offended, and shall betray one another, and shall hate one another. ¹¹ And many false prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many. ¹² And because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold.

¹³ But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved.

¹⁴ And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come.

³⁶ But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only. ⁴⁴ Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh.

I do not know when the Lord will return. It is closer now than it has ever been before. As much as today's events generate uncertainty and fear in my heart, I take great comfort in knowing those that "endure to the end, the same shall be saved." We are called to be ready because we never know when God will bring the world and all the various principalities operating today to an end.
