Three Christmas Eve Services and a Funeral

This Christmas Eve, I set an ambitious goal of attending three Christmas Eve services. Sharon was fully on board with this goal; except her mom ended up in the hospital and she needed to be with her that day. The first service was at Opendoor Church in Winterville where my daughter Amber attends and volunteers. The church had scheduled three services to accommodate the estimated crowd of people. I was advised to arrive at 12:15 pm for the first service at 1:00 pm. The auditorium was filled with young families with children. The music was contemporary and uplifting. The sermon was based on John 14:27, “*Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid.*” We shared the bread and the cup and held our candles high as we acknowledged the light of the world had come.

The second service was in Kinston at the Collective Church at 4:00 pm. This church was planted three years ago. Their first year was planning, the second year was in a local movie theatre, and last year, Spilman Memorial

Baptist Church opened its doors and created a space for the Collective to grow and thrive. Over the past year, they have grown rapidly through intentional ministry and life-changing outreach. In August the Collective launched a school, the Collective Leadership Academy, and they continue to transform adult’s and children’s lives. The Christmas Eve service included contemporary music, children engaged in singing, reciting poems, and reading scripture. The message was based on “Hope” citing several scripture passages. After the encouraging message, the bread and the cup were shared, and the congregation sang, “Silent Night” as they held lit candles.

My third service was at The Memorial Baptist Church in Greenville at 6:00 pm where my mother and sister attend. It was good to sit with my mom and sister listening to the traditional Christmas music, to new musical arrangements by John Rutter and Joseph Martin, a solo by the minister, and the traditional Christmas story from Luke 2:1-20.

The theme of “Come Home” was emphasized this Christmas Eve for so many that may have been away and unengaged over the past year. Following the message, the congregation came forward and shared the bread and cup followed by singing “Silent Night” with candles held high.

Each of these worship services were unique to their ministry setting, with many members participating, and meeting the needs of their congregation. Each service reminded me that in the fullness of time, God sent His Son, to a woman named Mary, engaged to a man named Joseph, born in the City of David called Bethlehem. Jesus came so that we might have peace in our lives, hope for our present circumstances, and a common bond among our brothers and sisters in Christ centered around Jesus’ death, burial, and resurrection. This common bond was demonstrated in each congregation’s service as we shared the bread and cup together and sang “Silent Night.”

I believe the Lord had one more lesson for me this Christmas. It was to attend the funeral of my 98-year-old friend, Charlotte Aycock in Fremont, the day after Christmas. I was privileged to serve as her Pastor for 16 years at Fremont Missionary Baptist Church. She was on the Pastor Search Committee that called me there in 2001. She offered advice and encouragement over the years, always gracious and kind in every conversation I had with her. She always sought reconciliation and encouraged me often with the phrase, “Throw a little love over the fence.”

I heard she was at Kitty Askins in Goldsboro and I went to see her a few weeks ago. Even though her body was weak, Charlotte’s mind was as clear as ever. We talked about many things, including my sudden departure from Fremont in 2017. After some time, she said to me, “I feel like the chain that was broken, has now been mended.” My heart melted as she so eloquently spoke the words I needed to hear.

That afternoon, the sanctuary was filled with family and friends that had come to celebrate and remember Charlotte’s life. The space was still filled with Christmas decorations and music that brought back thousands of memories all at once. The message of salvation was shared, the word of hope was given, a life well lived – anchored and centered in Jesus Christ – was celebrated.

Jesus came into the world to restore what was broken by sin. His death, burial, and resurrection is the only cure to mend our broken relationship with God and others. Receiving God’s gift of His Son will allow what was broken to be mended and allow us to enter into eternal life with God once our earthly life is over.

May God’s Spirit work in your heart this year to identify the broken chains in your life, and allow God to mend what was once broken.
